Today's Liturgy

Gospel: This dramatic story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead serves as a counter symbol for the resurrection of Jesus. That Lazarus was already dead for four days underlines that this is not merely a revival but a resuscitation to life of one who was truly dead. But the "four days" also stand in contrast to the "three days" that Jesus is truly dead before his resurrection and begins to hint at the fundamental difference between them. When Jesus called Lazarus from the tomb, his hands and feet were still bound with burial bands and his face was still wrapped in a burial cloth, symbolically indicating that, although he has been restored to life, he is destined to die again--he is still bound by the power of death. But the risen Jesus left behind in his tomb the burial cloths that bound him in death (20:5-7), symbolically indicating that his resurrection signifies the definitive victory over the power of death--he (unlike Lazarus) is no longer bound by the power of death and will never die again.

The resuscitation of Lazarus from death invites us to believe in Jesus as "the resurrection and the life"--the one who offers us a share in his victory over the bonds of death in an eternal life with its future and present dimensions. Whoever believes in Jesus has the hope that he "will live" eternal life in the future after he has died physically. And whoever "lives and believes" in Jesus "will never die" spiritually in this life but will live even now the eternal life that continues after our physical death.

Liturgia de hoy

Evangelio: esta dramática historia de Jesús resucitando a Lázaro de la muerte sirve como un símbolo contrario para la resurrección de Jesús. Que Lázaro ya estuvo muerto durante cuatro días subraya que esto no es simplemente un avivamiento sino una resucitación a la vida de alguien que realmente murió. Pero los "cuatro días" también contrastan con los "tres días" en que Jesús está verdaderamente muerto antes de su resurrección y comienza a insinuar la diferencia fundamental entre ellos. Cuando Jesús llamó a Lázaro de la tumba, sus manos y pies aún estaban atados con bandas de entierro y su rostro todavía estaba envuelto en un paño de entierro, lo que indicaba simbólicamente que, aunque ha sido restaurado a la vida, está destinado a morir de nuevo. Todavía está atado por el poder de la muerte. Pero el Jesús resucitado dejó en su tumba las telas de entierro que lo ataron en la muerte (20: 5-7), indicando simbólicamente que su resurrección significa la victoria definitiva sobre el poder de la muerte: él (a diferencia de Lázaro) ya no está atado Por el poder de la muerte y nunca volverá a morir.

La resucitación de Lázaro de la muerte nos invita a creer en Jesús como "la resurrección y la vida", la que nos ofrece una participación en su victoria sobre los lazos de la muerte en una vida eterna con sus dimensiones presentes y futuras. Quien crea en Jesús tiene la esperanza de que "vivirá" la vida eterna en el futuro después de que haya muerto físicamente. Y quienquiera que "viva y crea" en Jesús "nunca morirá" espiritualmente en esta vida, sino que vivirá incluso ahora la vida eterna que continúa después de nuestra muerte física. © 2003, OCP. 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Communal Penance

Communal Reconciliation

The communal reconciliation service provides a unique opportunity for Catholics to confess sins and find forgiveness. The communal celebration has certain advantages. The parish may celebrate one service with individual confessions instead of a sequence of private services. People confess their sins; they support and pray for other penitents; they are nourished by the proclamation of the Word and spiritual song; and they receive the support and prayer of others. Communal reconciliation reminds us that our sin affects others and that others will forgive the wrong we've done.

When you take part in a communal celebration of reconciliation, your confession takes a slightly different form. You perform some parts of the service as a community, not as individuals. Therefore, when you go individually to the priest in communal services:

- You need not make the sign of the cross.
- You need not say, "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned."
- You need not say how long it has been since your last confession unless this information would be helpful.
- You may say hello.
- You may say something about yourself which will help the priest extend God's mercy to you.
- You should confess your sins.
- You need not say the act of contrition.
- You should expect very little conversation and advice from the priest because others are waiting.
- You should arrive on time and stay for the end.

RECONCILIATION CHAPEL: Before Vatican II the Sacrament of Reconciliation, at that time called the Sacrament of Penance, or confession, was associated with a small dark room where the penitent maintained anonymity. The priest also could not be seen, and the two spoke to one another through a screen. Since Vatican II churches have incorporated larger rooms known as reconciliation chapels where the priest and penitent can sit together, share Scripture and celebrate the sacrament, now known as reconciliation. This provides more of an opportunity for the penitent to ask questions. Our chapel is located in the daily Mass chapel and the **Sacrament of Reconciliation is celebrated every Saturday at 4:30 PM.**

Liturgy Insights

THE CROSS: A cross often dominates the sanctuary of a Catholic church. We trace its lines at the beginning and end of every Mass and we venerate it every Good Friday. On solemn occasions we incense the cross first, even if it stands separate from the altar, to signify our respect for the suffering and death of Jesus.

For centuries the location of the cross never varied in a Catholic church. It rested on or above the altar against the back wall. Then in the 1960s we allowed the altar to come forward. This happily brought priest and people face to face around the table of the Eucharist, but the cross needed a new home. Resting on the altar or suspended above it, the cross would obstruct everybody's view. Besides, the top of the altar itself is reserved for the most important elements of the Mass, bread and wine and whatever else is absolutely necessary, like the book from which the priest prays.

The liturgy permits the use of a processional cross. If your parish wishes, you may lead the entrance procession into the church with the cross flanked by candles. Incense may prepare its way. When the cross leads the procession, it animates the first action of the Mass, even before we mark ourselves with its sign at the first words we speak. Once inside, the cross may stand somewhere near the altar. Its position may vary, depending on where other objects occupy the sanctuary.

Our church urges us to avoid duplicating images where we pray- having two or more statues of the same saint. For that reason, parishes that elect to lead processions with the cross need not provide another cross on the wall of the church. The processional cross that first draws our eyes in the service keeps them focused on Christ throughout.

The main cross of the church should carry the image of Christ crucified. A good cross is one that brings harmony to the sanctuary and inspires devotion among the people. Copyright © 1997 Resource Publications, Inc.,
