Today's Liturgy

Within the scene of the marriage feast at Cana we find the first occurrence of the theme of "the hour" which, Jesus specifies in response to his Mother, has not yet arrived. Jesus is referring, coherently with what John will observe later in 7,30 and 8,20, to the hour of his death. This entire episode has to be comprehended against the horizon of the progressive revelation that Jesus will make of himself so as to give rise to faith.

The miracle that Jesus works in Cana, as it is the first "sign," has the goal of revealing his glory which means to say his identity as the Son of God and the revealer of the Father, while, simultaneously, it allows the believers to perceive this very glory. Therefore, the miracle has a radical function in the order of faith, insofar as it can be welcomed only within faith, but also is intended to bring us to that faith.

By prodigiously giving the "good wine," that represents the full and perfect revelation, Jesus manifests himself symbolically and, implicitly, invites the individual to believe in his person. Those who taste the water changed into wine by Jesus now receive within the symbolic sign of the good and abundant wine that which they will receive through faith. Thus, the believers will obtain forgiveness for sins and eternal life at the moment of the ultimate "hour," when Jesus within his paschal mystery will realize the supreme revelation of Love himself through his own death.

Dentro de la escena de la fiesta matrimonial en Caná encontramos la primera aparición del tema de "la hora" que, según especifica Jesús en respuesta a su Madre, aún no ha llegado. Jesús se refiere, de manera coherente con lo que Juan observará más adelante en 7,30 y 8,20, a la hora de su muerte. Todo este episodio debe ser comprendido en el horizonte de la revelación progresiva que Jesús hará de sí mismo para dar origen a la fe.

El milagro que Jesús hace en Caná, ya que es la primera "señal", tiene el objetivo de revelar su gloria, lo que significa decir su identidad como el Hijo de Dios y el revelador del Padre, mientras que, al mismo tiempo, permite a los creyentes. Para percibir esta misma gloria. Por lo tanto, el milagro tiene una función radical en el orden de la fe, en la medida en que solo puede ser recibido dentro de la fe, pero también tiene la intención de llevarnos a esa fe.

Al dar prodigiosamente el "buen vino", que representa la revelación plena y perfecta, Jesús se manifiesta simbólicamente e, implícitamente, invita al individuo a creer en su persona. Aquellos que prueban el agua transformada en vino por Jesús ahora reciben dentro del signo simbólico del vino bueno y abundante lo que recibirán por medio de la fe. Así, los creyentes obtendrán el perdón por los pecados y la vida eterna en el momento de la "hora" final, cuando Jesús, en su misterio pascual, realizará la revelación suprema del Amor mismo a través de su propia muerte. © 2003, OCP. Liturgy Insights

ORDINARY TIME: The color green in the church tells us that we are back in Ordinary Time. Actually the word “ordinary” does not mean routine but “counted” or “ordinal” time. We enter into these 2nd, 3rd, 4th Sundays ... all counted one after another. Winter Ordinary Time is just a few short weeks until we enter into the season of Lent. Summer and Fall Ordinary Time comprises the longest portion of the Liturgical Year, covering as much as six months of the Calendar. Ordinary Time challenges us with the demands of building the reign of God. We listen to the Word of God which keeps reminding us of our call as Christians to internalize the teachings of the Lord and to live out what we proclaim. The miracles and the parables of Jesus are, for the most part, the subject of the Gospel readings. The task that we are given is the same task Jesus had—to proclaim the reign of God in our midst—so this is hardly an ordinary mission. The prayers of the Eucharist ask for the gifts necessary to accomplish this task and they carry the same message: “Bring forth the Reign of God!”

A QUICK LESSON IN AFRICAN AMERICAN CATHOLIC HISTORY: Did you know that the first black people in what is now the United States were Catholics? In the first European-style city established here, St. Augustine, Florida, a large percentage of Spanish-speaking black Catholic families lived. Some of these were free blacks, and some were slaves. In 1781, El Pueblo de La Reina de los Angeles (today just “Los Angeles”) was founded with only 11 families. All were Catholic, over half were black, and there were only 2 whites in the entire group! In 1789, the famous Catholic bishop John Carroll wrote, “Of 15,000 Catholics in Maryland, 3,000 are black Catholic slaves.” The original founder of the city of Chicago (established in 1837) was a black Catholic French-speaking trader and trapper named John Baptiste duSable.

Three of the Healy brothers, born in Georgia, were the first black Catholic priests in the United States. James Healy, a member of the Society of St. Sulpice, was ordained in 1854 — the year Augustus Tolton was born. His brother Alexander also joined the Society and was ordained in 1858. Their brother Patrick entered the Jesuits and was ordained in France in 1862. James became the second bishop of Portland, Maine, in 1875 — the first black bishop in the United States. Patrick was the first black university president when he became the head of Georgetown College in 1874. Sadly, he always felt unable to talk about his African ancestry in his community. After the Civil War, Patrick Healy was instrumental in developing the college into Georgetown University.

Henriette DeLille (died 1862), a descendant of slaves, is the first native-born African American whose cause for canonization has been opened by the Roman Catholic Church. In 1836, she and another woman tried to form an integrated congregation of vowed women religious, but the segregation laws of the state of Louisiana made it nearly impossible. In 1842, they began by forming a pious union. They took vows in 1852 and were recognized as a religious congregation by Rome in 1870. It was not until 1872 that they were allowed to wear a religious habit, however, due to racist attitudes toward the Sisters of the Holy Family. Today 250 Sisters of the Holy Family minister in four states as well as in Belize, Central America. We pray that the pope will soon name Mother Henriette DeLille as venerable, the first step toward being recognized as a saint:
